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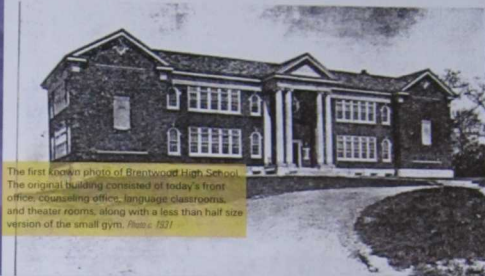

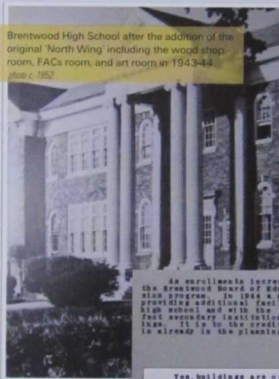
BRENTWOOD HIGH SCHOOL HISTORY



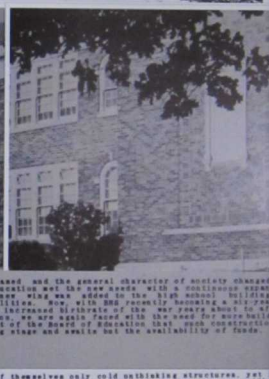
The first yearbook produced by the 4-year-old Brentwood High School. The Brentwood Scream. Photo: 1932

As enrollments increased and the general character of society changed, the Brentwood Board of Education met the new needs with a dedicated vision. In 1942, a new wing was added to the 1931 existing building, providing additional facilities. Now, with 800 pupils, Brentwood High School met with the increased demands of the war years about to arrive. It is in the credit of the Board of Education that such construction is already in the planning stage and will be the availability of funds.

Yes, buildings are of themselves only cold unthinking structures. Yet in a high school they reflect love and serious thought by many persons with a common aim—educational progress.

The supervisor conferred with the proper authorities with reference to your educational program and problems and gave recommendations regarding them. You are to be commended for the addition which has been made to the curriculum—expansion. To note that your building facilities are now in good repair. We have been favorably impressed this year, as in the immediate past years, with your successful efforts to meet a well-balanced and effective, well health and character education.

Dear Mr. McLean:

We have received the report of Mr. F. S. McLean, who recently had the pleasure of visiting your school and the high school, as first class with 80 pupils.

The general organization of your school is very satisfactory. The program of studies is being offered. The report on the introduction to music and vocational practices have been submitted this year. We believe these are a situation.

You have employed a well-trained administrative and teaching personnel and there is much evidence that good work is being done. The report shows that fifteen of the thirty-three members of your faculty are new to your school system this year. Such a high percentage of new personnel merits commendation. Additional administrative and supervisory responsibilities to those charged with these duties. You are to be commended for the splendid summer in which these new teachers have been oriented into the total school situation.

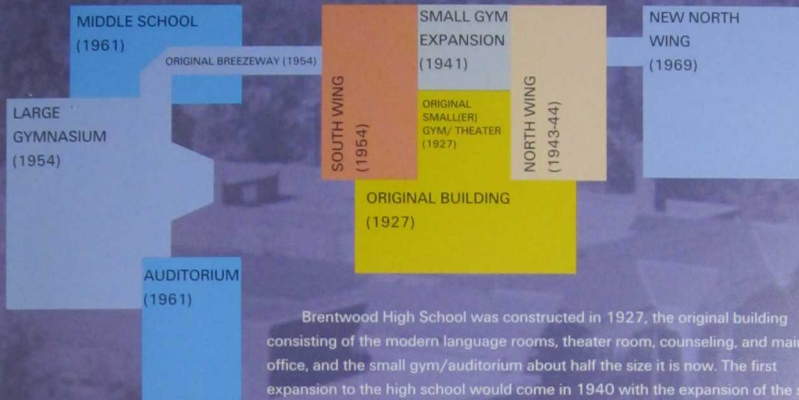
We are very interested in your plans for an addition to your high school building to provide adequate quarters for your courses in shop, music, home, and home economics and that you will not be unduly delayed in going forward with this building program. You are to be commended especially for the additions which have been made to the equipment in the commercial, science, and state departments this year.

We trust you have approved a budget for the coming school year which will provide the needs of each division of your school system as far as finances permit. When this document comes to our service, we shall be pleased to have

Brentwood High School was constructed in 1927, the original building consisting of the modern language rooms, theater room, counseling, and main office, and the small gym/auditorium about half the size it is now. The first expansion to the high school would come in 1940 with the expansion of the small gym/auditorium to the size it is today. The expansion of the small gym also led to the addition of the original north wing in 1943, the building that now has the art room, journalism room, FACs room and wood shop.

The next major change to Brentwood High School would come nearly a decade later in the form of three new structures, the south wing, with the middle school history rooms, personal finance, and business rooms, as well as the choir room, and an English room. This addition was also accompanied by the large gym and south breezeway.

The third round of construction to the high school was done in 1961 with the addition of the main middle school building and auditorium. Consequently, the stage in the small gym was also walled over at this same time.

Finally the last addition to the high school came in 1969 with what is now referred to as the north wing, featuring the science labs, math rooms, high school history rooms, library and computer labs.

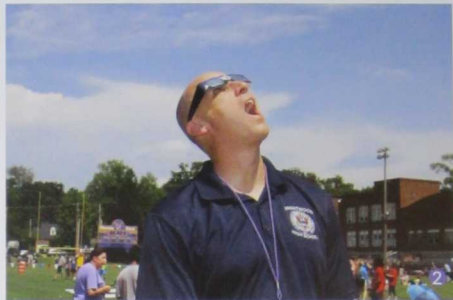

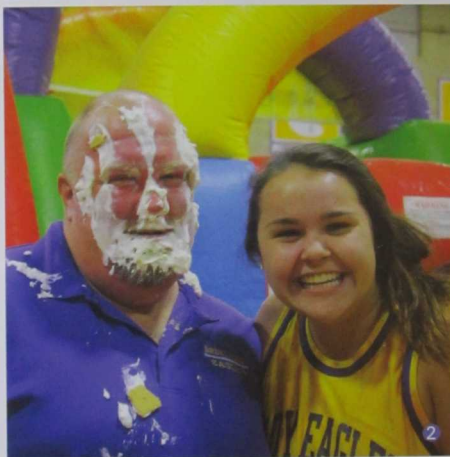

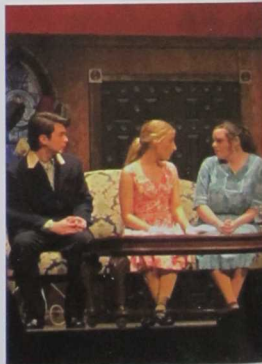


Behind the Scenes

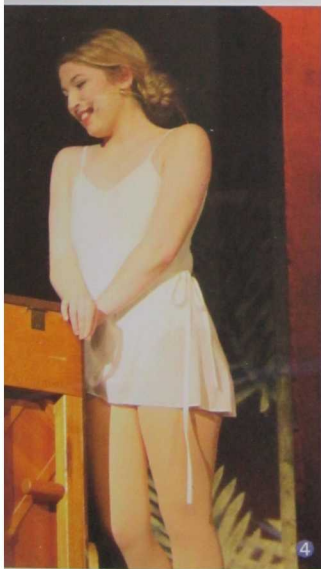

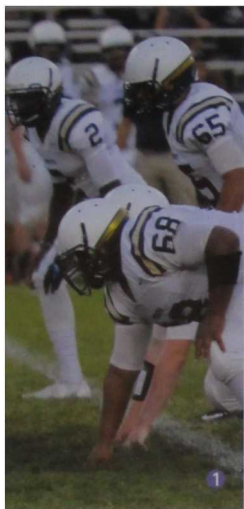

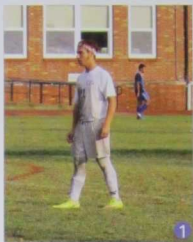

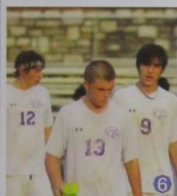

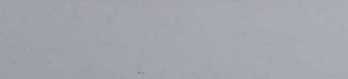

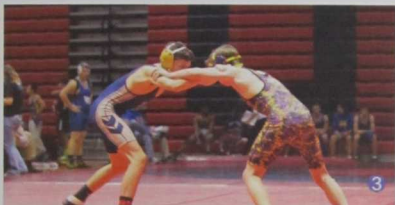

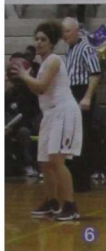

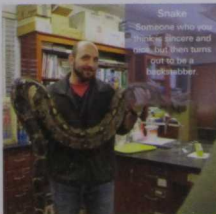

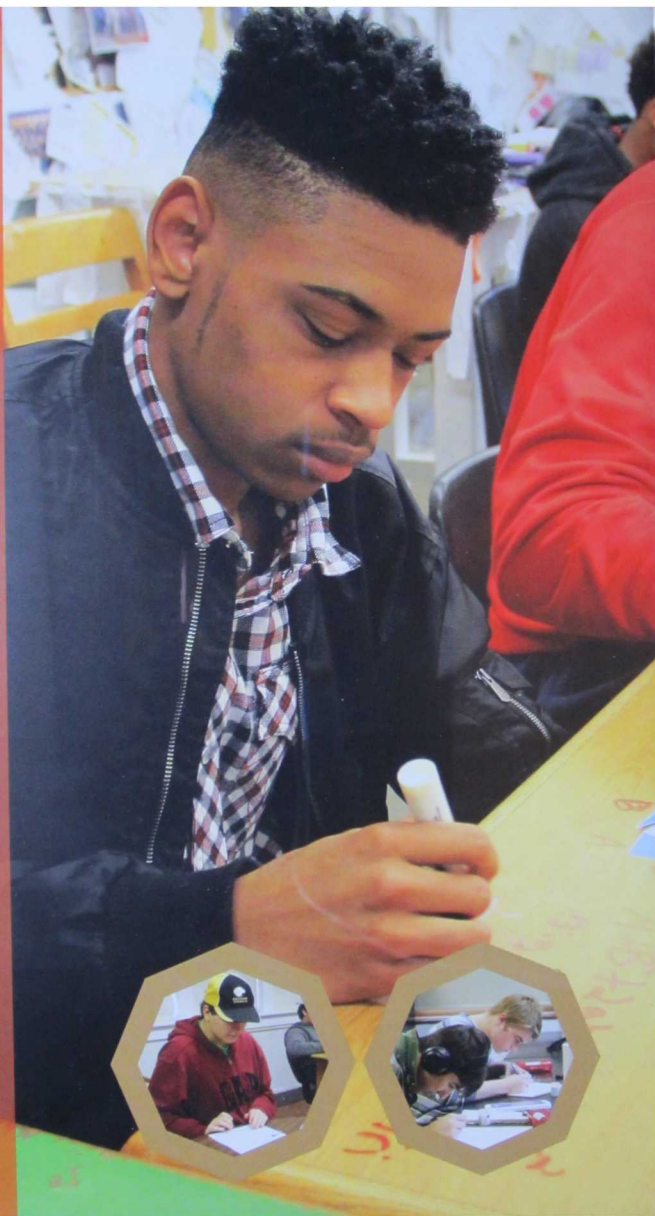

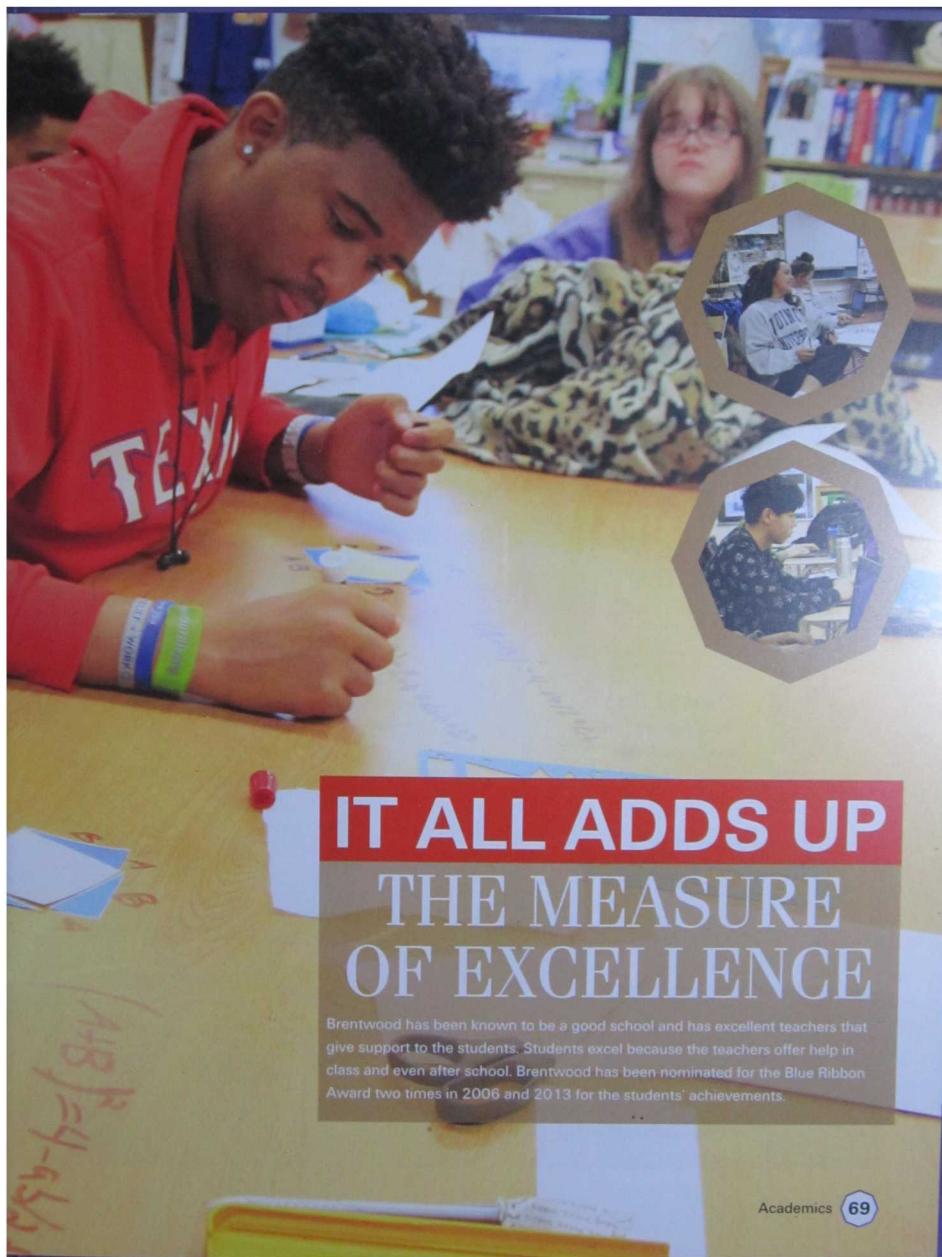

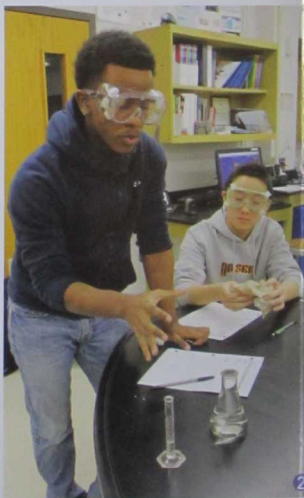

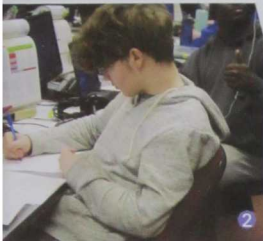

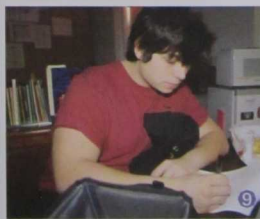

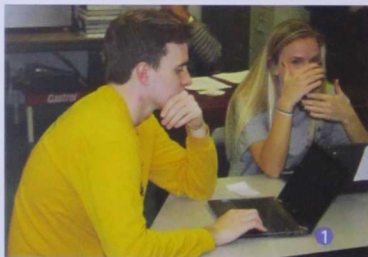

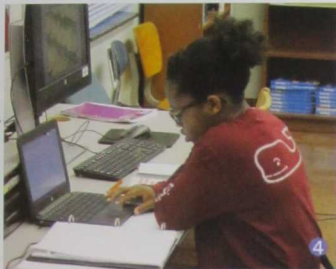

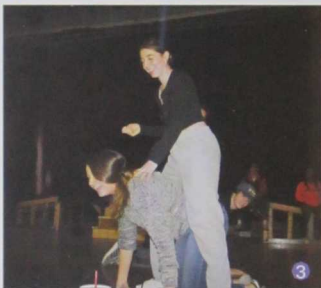

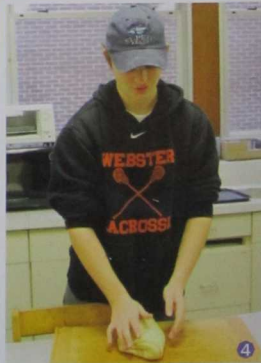

Cooking With RHODES: Molten chocolate cakes

Ingredients: Unsweetened baking cocoa, 6 oz semisweet baking chocolate, chopped, 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons butter, 3 whole eggs, 3 egg yolks, 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar, 1/2 cup all purpose flour, additional powdered sugar, if desired.

Pouring the Batter.

Heat oven to 450 degrees, grease bottoms and sides of six (6-oz) custard cups with shortening, dust with cocoa. In 2-quart saucepan, melt chocolate and butter over low heat, stirring frequently. Cool slightly.

DELICIOUS RESULTS! Bake 12 to 14 minutes or until sides are set and centers are still soft (tops will be puffed and cracked). Let stand 3 minutes. Run small knife or metal spatula along sides of cakes to loosen. Immediately place heatproof serving plate upside down over each cup, turn plate and cup over. Remove cup. 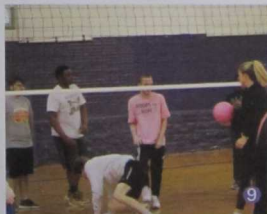

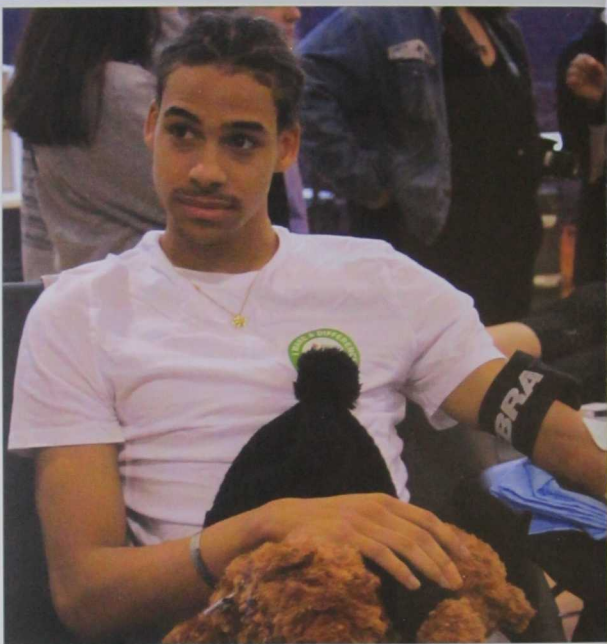

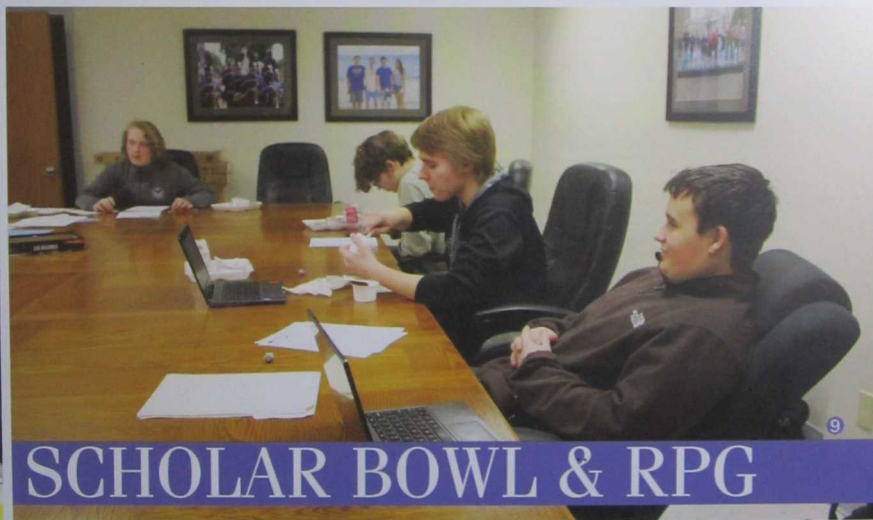

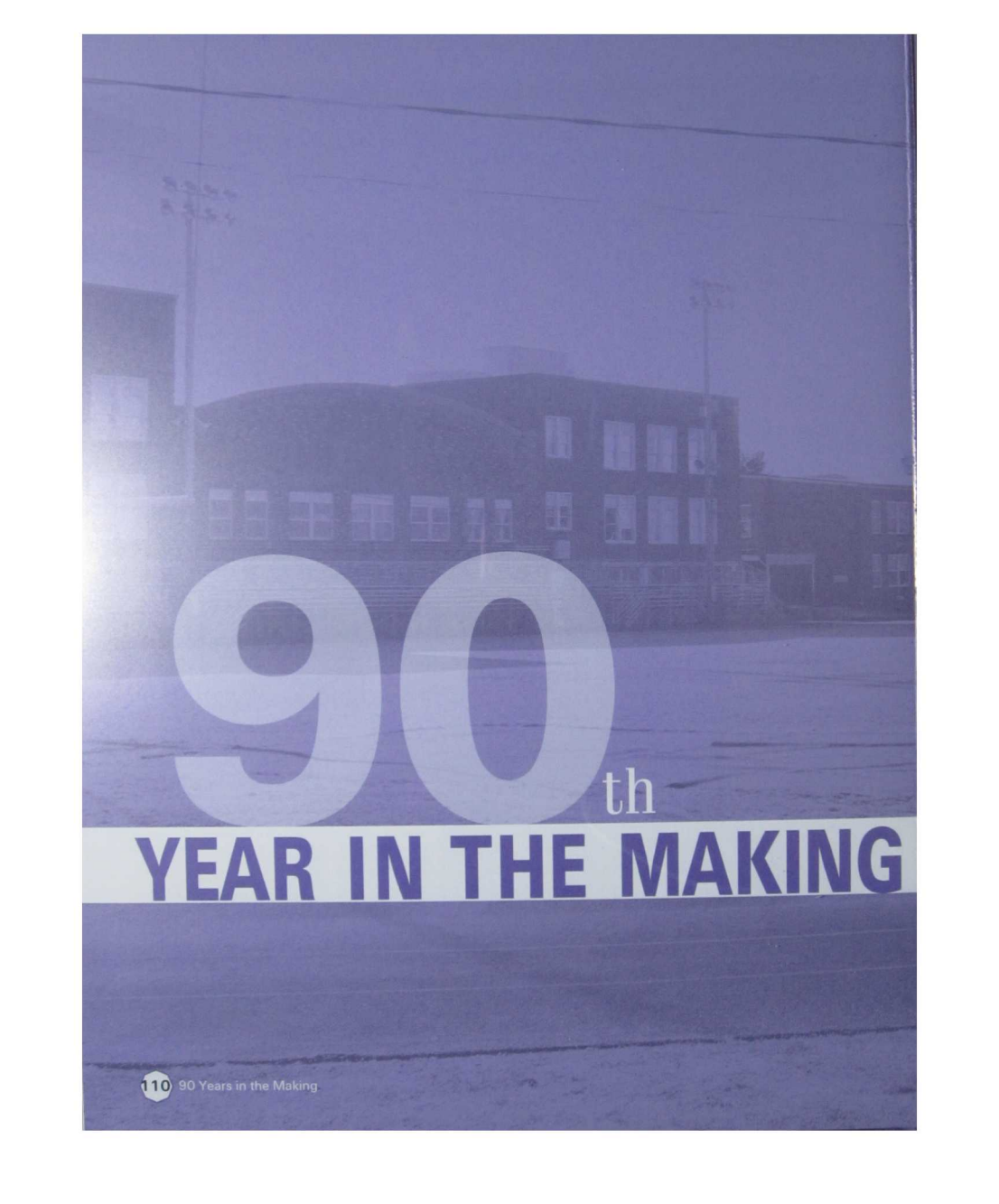
